#### Liberal and PCs still in tight race in Ontario

#### NDP fall back, slim Liberal majority seen

TORONTO JUNE 5<sup>th</sup>, 2014 - In a random sampling of public opinion taken by the Forum Poll™ among 1022 Ontario voters, relatively equal proportions, just less than four tenths each, will vote Liberal (39%) or PC (37%) in the upcoming election June 12th. This represents an incremental increase in vote share for both parties since the last time we polled (May 28, Liberals 36%, PCs 36%), which is coupled with a reciprocal decrease in the NDP vote from one fifth (20%) on May 28 to less than this today (17%). Few will vote Green (6%) or for any other party (1%).

The Liberal vote is characteristic of Gen X (45 to 54 - 43%), females (44%), the wealthiest (\$100K to \$250K - 50%) and those in the Toronto 416 area code (45%). The PC vote is common to the oldest (46%), males (43%), mid income groups (\$40K to \$60K - 42%) in eastern Ontario (49%). The NDP vote is strongest among the youngest (25%), females (20%), the least wealthy (27%) and those in Toronto 416 (21%). Of note, one quarter of past NDP voters will vote Liberal this time (24%), and, in fact, just more than half will vote NDP again (57%).

#### Slim Liberal majority in the cards

If these results are projected up to seats in a 107 seat Legislature, the Liberals would take a 2 seat majority of 57 (up from 50 on May 28), to 39 for the PCs (down from 42 last week). The NDP would take just 11 seats, down from 15.

#### Kathleen Wynne seen to make the best Premier, strong gender gap

In a ranking of best person for Premier, Kathleen Wynne continues to lead with a third of the vote (32% this week, 31% last week), while just more than a quarter think Tim Hudak best (26% now, 28% last week). Fewer see Andrea Horwath as Premier material (18% now and last week). Females are much more likely to pick Wynne on this measure (37%) than Hudak (21%), while men are more likely to pick Hudak (31%) than Wynne (28%). Horwath appeals equally across genders (males - 18%, females - 19%).

"Despite predictions to the contrary, this remains a tight race, at least for Kathleen Wynne and Tim Hudak. It appears that voters have begun to blame Andrea Horwath for getting us into an election which may not change the political landscape at all, and this could be hurting her," said Forum Research President, Dr. Lorne Bozinoff.

#### Methodology

The Forum Poll™ was conducted by Forum Research with the results based on an interactive voice response telephone survey of 1022 randomly selected Ontarians 18 years of age and older. The poll was conducted on June 5<sup>th</sup>, 2014.

Results based on the total sample are considered accurate +/- 3%, 19 times out of 20. Subsample results will be less accurate. Margins of error for subsample (such as age, gender) results are available at www.forumresearch.com/samplestim.asp

Where appropriate, the data has been statistically weighted by age, region, and other variables to ensure that the sample reflects the actual population according to the latest Census data.

This research is not necessarily predictive of future outcomes, but rather, captures opinion at one point in time. Actual results will depend on the parties' success at getting their voters out. Forum Research conducted this poll as a public service and to demonstrate our survey research capabilities.
