# Liberals and Tories Neck and Neck in Upcoming Nova Scotia Provincial Election

### **Liberal Minority Government Likely**

Toronto, Aug 16<sup>th</sup>, 2021 – In a random sampling of public opinion taken by The Forum Poll™ among 993 Nova Scotia voters, among those decided and leaning, 38.6% will vote for the Liberals, followed by 36% for the Progressive Conservatives.

The New Democrats are projected to get 21% of the vote.

The Green Party are projected to get 3.2% of the vote.

Other parties are expected obtain 1.2%.

Voters most likely to vote Liberal include those aged 65+ (47%), those whose incomes less than \$20,000 (47%), female (41%), and those who live in Cape Breton (41%).

Voters most likely to vote Conservative include those who live in North Nova Scotia (46%), whose incomes are between \$100,000-\$250,000 (45%), male (41%), and those aged between 35-44 (40%).

## Liberals to form minority

The Liberals are expected to form a minority government with 25 of the 55 seats in the legislature, while the Progressive Conservatives are expected to take 22 seats. The NDP will get 8 seats.

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#### HIGHLIGHTS:

- If the election were held today, 38.6% of decided / leaning voters would vote for the Liberals, followed by Conservatives (36%) and NDP (21%).
- These voting intention results, if held on election day, would likely yield approximately 25 Liberal seats, 22 Tory seats, and 8 NDP seats.



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# Methodology

The Forum Poll™ was conducted by Forum Research with the results based on an interactive voice response telephone survey of 993 randomly selected Nova Scotia Voters. The poll was conducted Aug 16<sup>th</sup>, 2021.

Results based on the total sample are considered accurate +/- 3 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. Subsample results will be less accurate. Margins of error for subsample (such as age, gender) results are available at <a href="https://www.forumresearch.com/samplestim.asp">www.forumresearch.com/samplestim.asp</a>

Where appropriate, the data has been statistically weighted by age, region, and other variables to ensure that the sample reflects the actual population according to the latest Census data.

This research is not necessarily predictive of future outcomes, but rather, captures opinion at one point in time. Actual results depend on a party's ability to get their voters out. Forum Research conducted this poll as a public service and to demonstrate our survey research capabilities.
